WELCOME TO CORRECTIONAL INVESTIGATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course will examine the investigation practices that take place within correctional facilities. The course will examine the investigatory methods and practices used by law enforcement in combatting drugs, escape, theft, sexual assault, murder and other crimes within the correctional arena.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students will identify the history and evolution of criminal investigations within the correctional setting.
- 2. Describe and evaluate the elements of correctional investigation and pre-sentence court reports
- 3. Describe and compare the community and government agencies that affect the correctional investigation process.

Student Learning Outcome: Explain the evolution of modern criminal investigation within the correctional setting.

Student Learning Outcome: Analyze the effect that community agencies have had on correctional programs and procedures.
